Help your child get ready to learn to read!

Each day features a fun activity that will help your child build pre-reading skills. Activities are color-coded by skill. Ask your children's librarian for more ideas on how to promote early literacy skills with daily activities at home.

27 **Stories**

On New Year's Day, have your child tell you a story about something she wants to do in the coming year.

28 **Sounds**

Ask your child how many words she can think of that have the same beginning sound as "January."

29 **Songs**

Sing "Do Your Ears Hang Low?" and march along as you sing.

30 **Rhymes**

On National Spaghetti Day, read the fun rhyming story *Spaghetti with the Yeti* by Adam and Charlotte Gullain together.

1 **Writing**

It's National Bird Day. Have your child draw a picture of his favorite bird. Then, have him draw another picture of an imaginary bird.

2 **Reading**

It's National Cuddle Up Day! Grab a favorite blanket and cuddle up with your child to read a favorite book together.

3 **Play**

Play a game in which you each pretend to be a different animal.

4 **Science**

On National Bubble Bath Day, mix 1 cup shampoo, 1½ cups water, and food coloring in an empty shampoo bottle. Shake and use to create a colorful bath!

5 **Sounds**

Have your child listen to two different versions of the same song. Ask her which one she liked better and why.

6 **Songs**

Make up a song about winter and sing it to the tune of "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star."

6 **Science**

Celebrate National Milk Day by making homemade chocolate milk: mix 8 oz. of milk, 1½ tsp. unsweetened cocoa powder, and 1 tsp. powdered sugar.

7 **Math**

Help your child use a ruler to measure several objects around the house. Which object is longest? Which is shortest?

8 **Stories**

It's National Sticker Day. Have your child put animal stickers on a piece of paper and tell you a story about what the animals are doing.

9 **Reading**

Read *Over and Under the Snow* by Kate Messner together.

10 **Rhymes**

It's National Hat Day. How many words can your child think of that rhyme with "hat"?

11 **Writing**

Write the word "winter" on white paper. Then, have your child trace each letter several times with different colored pencils.

12 **Rhymes**

How many different rhyming poems that start with "Roses are red, winter is cold" can you and your child think of?

13 **Reading**

On Winnie the Pooh Day, read aloud from *The Complete Tales of Winnie-the-Pooh*.

14 **Math**

On National Popcorn Day, make some together and use the pieces to do simple math problems.

15 **Play**

Ask your child to teach you his favorite game. Let him make up his own rules!

16 **Reading**

On Squirrel Appreciation Day, read *The Secret Life of Squirrels* by Nancy Rose together.

17 **Science**

Find a few foods that taste different, such as salty, sweet, and sour. Ask your child which she likes best!

18 **Writing**

On National Handwriting Day, have your child practice writing his name, making each letter a different color.

19 **Sounds**

How many words can your child think of that have the same beginning sound as her name?

20 **Play**

Have fun being silly on National Opposite Day. Wear pajamas during the day, have breakfast for dinner, and say "goodbye" when you enter a room.

21 **Stories**

Take turns telling stories about what animals do in the winter. Where do they live? What do they eat? Be creative!

22 **Science**

It's National Chocolate Cake Day. Bake a cake together and talk about what happens to the batter as it bakes in the oven.

23 **Songs**

Sing favorite songs as you are driving in the car together.

24 **Math**

It's National Puzzle Day. Before putting a puzzle together, have your child sort the pieces by color or size.

25 **Reading**

Open a book. Ask your child how many words he can pick out on the page.

26 **Writing**

It's Inspire Your Heart with Art Day. Put out craft and coloring supplies, and encourage your child to create an original work of art.
